REGISTRATION ENDS OCTOBER 11

- In person at a local elections office or at many post offices. libraries, or high schools
- Mail a voter registration postcard to your local elections office. To request a postcard with prepaid postage be sent to you visit: https://www.sos.state.tx.us/elections/voter/regvr.shtml

VOTING

- EARLY VOTING: October 24-November 4
- **ABSENTEE VOTING:** To be eligible to vote absentee by mail. Texas votes must be 65 or older, sick or disabled, out of the county on Election Day and the early voting period, or confined in jail but otherwise eligible.
 - **BY MAIL:** Ballots must be postmarked before 7 PM on November 8 and received by 5 PM on November 9 to be counted.
 - ONLINE: Voters can print an "Application for Absentee Ballot by Mail" (ABBM) online or request an ABBM be sent to them at https://bbm.sos.state.tx.us/bbm.asp
 - IN PERSON: Weekdays 6 AM-10 PM, Sundays 9 AM-10 PM. Check polling place for hours.
- IN-PERSON ON NOVEMBER 8: Polls are open from 7 AM to 7 PM (voters in line by 7 PM will still be allowed to vote)
- You will need to show a valid photo ID. Visit https://www.votetexas.gov/voting/need-id.html to see list of accepted forms.





KNOW YOUR VOTING RIGHTS

- You are eligible to vote if you:
 - Are a U.S. citizen and a Texas resident
 - Will be at least 18 years old on or before Election Day
 - Are not currently serving time in jail or on parole/probation for a felony conviction
- For voters in jail or with convictions:
 - You CAN vote if you are in jail awaiting trial or serving time for a misdemeanor conviction. Contact your jail administrator to register to vote and vote absentee. You CANNOT vote if you are in jail serving time for a felony conviction.
 - If you were convicted of a felony, you will automatically regain your voting rights after completing your sentence, including any parole or probation.
- For voters experiencing homelessness:
 - You can use any physical address that you plan to return to as your residence when registering to vote. This can be a shelter or other organization you receive services from, a park where you sleep, a vacant lot that your car is parked in, etc.
